Guidance for students – Keele's 24-step mark scale

Your work for Level 7 will be marked using the University's **24-step marking scale**.

This scale has 24-steps on it, each of which falls into one of the classes of performance which correspond to the overall degree classification. The University uses these classes of performance for most, but not all, postgraduate modules*.

70-100	Distinction
60-69	Merit
50-59	Pass
0-49	Fail

**Where exceptions to the above table exist (e.g., in the case of some apprenticeship or professional programmes), this will be made clear to you through the assessment brief.*

There are three versions of the generic assessment criteria, the first for written assessments, the second for presentation-type assessments (e.g., oral and poster presentations, podcasts and vlogs etc), and the third for reflective assessments (e.g., reflective diaries and logs). Staff must make clear to you which of the three versions of the generic assessment criteria apply to each assessment item via the assessment brief.

Where adaptation of the generic assessment criteria is required for specific types of assessment (e.g., creating computer code, language tests, creative work) or in specific contexts (e.g., TNE provision and international partnerships), staff must produce revised assessment criteria that comply with the 24-step marking approach and reflect the bands used in the generic criteria as closely as possible. Staff must include these adapted criteria, which require approval by School Education Committee, in your assessment brief.

Within each version of the generic assessment criteria, the University has generic descriptors for work which falls within each of the grade boundaries shown above. There is a descriptor for work which falls within the Distinction range (or the first-class range for students on integrated Master's programmes), another for the Merit range (or the upper second-class range for students on integrated Master's programmes), and so on. The mark that each piece of your work receives depends on the extent to which it satisfies the elements in the generic descriptors.

The person marking your work will consider it alongside the generic assessment criteria to decide which class of performance the work falls into. The marker will then determine the extent to which your work meets the criteria to arrive at a judgment about the position (high, mid, low) within that class.

What if my module has more than one piece of assessment?

If a module has more than one assessment component the mark for each piece of assessment is determined using the 24-step mark scale and then the marks are averaged,

taking account of each of the assessment components' respective weightings, in order to produce the module result. This is expressed as a percentage. Your overall module mark therefore be any whole number up to 100 and is not limited to one of the marks on the scale.

Does the 24-step mark scale apply to all pieces of work?

No. The 24-step mark scale is applied to single assessment components where an assessment of the quality of the work is made and a single overall mark awarded. There are some assessments such as KLE tests, class tests, numerical tests, where an answer is either correct or incorrect and marks are awarded accordingly. The 24-step mark scale does not apply to these assessments and so you may, for example receive a mark of (e.g.,) 63% for a class test. This mark will remain and will not be rounded to 65%.

What should I do if I am unsure about whether or not the 24-step mark scale applies to my assessment?

You should contact your module leader, or the person who set the work in the first instance and ask them to clarify whether or not the 24-step mark scale applies to that assessment.

Generic Assessment Criteria Staff Guidance

1. The aim of the generic assessment criteria is to ensure that at Keele we reward our students appropriately for their achievements. The generic Level 7 marking criteria were implemented following recognition that there are some important differences between postgraduate and undergraduate work, including mark scales and classification banding, but also expectations surrounding the quality of the work produced at Level 7. Close similarities between the marking descriptors have been maintained wherever relevant across Levels 3-7.
2. There are three versions of the generic assessment criteria. One for written assessments, one for presentation-type assessments (e.g., oral and poster presentations, vlogs, podcasts, elevator pitches etc), and one for reflective work (e.g., reflective logs and diaries). Staff must use the version of the generic assessment criteria that most closely aligns with the nature of the assessment that they are marking. Staff must make clear to students which version of the three generic assessment criteria are being used for each assessment at the beginning of a module and via the module assessment briefs.
3. When using the criteria, staff should note that in each band, the detailed descriptor states “work that is typically characterised by”. It is not necessary for work to fulfil all the criteria absolutely. The extent to which the criteria need to be fulfilled to gain a particular mark remains a matter of professional academic judgement.
4. Where adaptation of the generic assessment criteria is required for specific types of assessment (e.g., creating computer code, language tests, creative work) or in specific contexts (e.g., TNE provision and international partnerships), staff must produce revised assessment criteria that comply with the 24-step marking approach and reflect the bands used in the generic criteria as closely as possible. These revised criteria must be justifiable within the context of the assessment type and must be approved by School Education Committee (SECs). Staff must include these adapted criteria in their assessment briefs, which are approved by SECs at the start of each Semester. Revised criteria must also be communicated clearly to students at the beginning of a module.
5. The generic assessment criteria and the accompanying 24-step mark scale should be used where an assessment of the quality of the work is made. For some types of assessment, application of the 24-step mark scale is not appropriate because the mark awarded is based on a series of correct or incorrect answers, with marks awarded accordingly. Examples of assessment types where the 24-step mark scale should not be used include: class tests, KLE quizzes, tests with a series of short answer questions, numerical/mathematical tests.
6. If a module has more than one assessment component* the mark for each piece of assessment is determined using the 24-step mark scale and then the marks are averaged, taking account of each of the assessment components’ respective weightings, to produce the module result. This is expressed as a percentage. An overall module mark can therefore be any whole number up to 100 and is not limited to one of the marks on the scale.

Worked Examples:

- **A module contains two assessment components , (1) an essay (20% of the module mark) and, (2) a consultancy style report (80% of the module mark).** For both assessments, the generic assessment criteria for written work should be used. The 24-step mark scale and accompanying descriptors should be applied to both pieces of assessment individually, with the overall module mark a weighted average of the two marks. Note the overall module mark should remain as a weighted average and should not be adjusted to match the 24-step mark scale. It is therefore possible to have overall module marks of any whole number between 0 and 100.
 - **A module contains two assessment components , (1) a KLE quiz (20% of the module mark) and, (2) a Podcast (80% of the module mark).** The generic assessment criteria for presentations should be used to mark the podcast assessment. The 24-step mark scale and accompanying descriptors should be applied to the podcast assessment only. The marks for the KLE quiz are automatically calculated based on whether answers are correct or not and should not be adjusted to match the 24-step mark scale. The overall module mark will be a weighted average of the two assessments and again, could be any whole number between 0 and 100. The overall module mark should not be adjusted to match the 24-step mark scale.
7. It is important that these criteria are communicated effectively to students through the relevant assessment briefs. Separate guidance for students exists to accompany the generic assessment criteria.
8. In the case of 'Integrated' degrees, it is required that work undertaken at level 7 will be marked using the level 7 generic marking criteria.
9. The criteria have been carefully cross referenced with Keele's PGT regulations - in particular, colleagues should note:
- 45% is the threshold mark for "compensation" of an overall module mark for PGT students ([Regulation D5](#)).

**An assessment component is an assessment item which is listed in the module descriptor separately as a single assessment item and recorded on SCIMS with a single mark.*
