3.	Minutes and Actions The minutes of the meetings on 22 June 2022, 8 <sup>th</sup> July 2022 and 16 <sup>th</sup> August 2022 were approved as an accurate record of the meeting subject to corrections to the date on the attendance list for 8 <sup>th</sup> July 2022 meeting.  The actions list was noted.		
4.	Matters Arising The Chair confirmed that the Chief People Officer was reviewing mechanisms to hear the 'staff voice' and would be re-establishing the Staff Voice Group or other equivalent mechanism as a result of that review.		
5.	(a) KeeleSU Report  Senate received the update from the Students' Union on current activities and campaigns. It was noted that the new Sabbatical Officer team was in place, focus for the year would be on 5 themes of student safety & wellbeing, access & inclusivity, quality education, cost of living and a fair and sustainable world. Senate members were encouraged to support the work of the Students Union under each of these themes.  It was reported that 1564 students have signed up to clubs and societies in welcome week.  Senate recognised the recent coverage in the national media of the cases of suicide in the sector which have resulted in universities being criticised for their role in not preventing the suicide. Colleagues were advised that Student Services were leading a review of the recently updated guidance and how this can be appropriately		
	implemented at Keele, overseen by Education Committee. Academic colleagues were reminded that suicide prevention training was available and all were encouraged to take part where able.

	Exceptional Circumstances Code of Practice
	approved by UEC; Senate noted that Student
	representatives had requested no limit to the
	number of 7-day automatic extensions, but it was
	agreed during development of the CoP that a
	limit of 3 per semester was in the best interests
	of the student and in line (if not more generous)
	than other institutions' approaches. Senate also
	noted that the requirement to submit draft work
	to date, when requesting an extension was rarely
	complied with, as such it was suggested that this
	was removed from the CoP. It was agreed that
	the EC Oversight Group would consider this
	proposal, at its first meeting.
	Plans for a Review of the organisation,
	scheduling and administration of exam boards
	Our institutional response to the NSS 2022
	feedback; the analysis prompted Senate to raise
	concerns about students with disabilities and
	accessibility to teaching spaces. It was reported
	that Timetabling work with Estates to manage
	these issues as they arise, but that it is
	recognised further work is required and is
	underway. Senate suggested that the removal of
	reception spaces in Schools could account for
	weaker NSS performance. Senate were
	reminded of the scope of the questions within
	NSS and the analysis in the document and also

that NSS performance in some Schools was

- exceptionally good and there was no correlation between School reception areas (of which there are none) and the performance of Schools in the NSS outcomes.
- International Year rules: Senate raised the matter of students who complete level 6 with outstanding international year marks, are often unable to graduate on normal timescales and this therefore can impact on employment and/or further study options. Senate were advised that students are informed of this risk before they take the decision to undertake the international year, it was also noted that the process has been streamlined as much as possible and that international partners are reminded of the deadlines at Keele, although it was noted that some partners have been repeatedly subjecting students to delay. The University will continue to remind partners of our deadlines for processing awards.

Senate queried how QR monies will be allocated following the REF results. Senate were advised that the QR funding allocation has been shared with the University and that there is an overall increase of 8%, although this is not unilateral across the Schools. A decision on the method for internal allocation of QR funds has not yet been agreed. It was noted that there is the potential to 'top slice' for strategic research initiatives, given the £500k of additional funding now allocated.

#### 9. Recruitment Update

Senate received the report on student recruitment and admissions and noted that since its circulation, the numbers have changed, and an updated set of numbers will be circulated with the minutes.

It was reported that this September had seen Keele's highest ever recruitment figures, which was building on last year, which was Keele's previous largest ever intake.

Recruitment was positive in all areas with the exception of home PGT recruitment, which was slightly down on enrolments, likely reflecting the more competitive and attractive employment opportunities available in comparison to last year.

Senate were reminded of the forthcoming open day across the weekend, which expected c2500 students across the two days. Senate members expressed concerns about the 'mystery shopper' activity planned for the Open Day. Senators were reminded that the primary purpose was to inform GSRA of areas for improvement at the away-day and not to identify any issues with individual staff member performance. Senate was also informed that the CAS issue resulting from extraordinary overseas student recruitment activity this year would be mitigated in future by a clearer strategy for the allocation of CAS allowances, alongside a strategic proposal to UKVI for an additional CAS allowance from next academic year.
