How the programme will be taught <i>(include any significant changes to the balance between on campus and digital delivery and what students can expect)</i>	For each module, in situ and online Psychology teaching will be delivered synchronously ('live') during timetabled slots, blended with learning materials released on a regular basis featuring recorded content, student-led, and active learning activities, providing students with the flexibility to access learning resources in their own time. In general, lab classes and some seminars will be delivered in situ, while lectures and other seminar-type delivery will be provided online, through a mixture of synchronous (timetabled) and asynchronous (flexible, in your own time between timetabled sessions) delivery.
Changes to placements, field courses or other practical activities <i>(where applicable)</i>	Due to social distancing the visit to Monkey Forest will not be going ahead (PSY-20038).
Learning resources and any potential additional costs <i>(such as equipment requirements)</i>	Given an increasing level of online teaching and assessments for this programme, it would be preferable if students had access to computer equipment with a webcam and microphone. It may also be preferable for students to have adequate Wi-Fi connectivity and associated internet speeds. Students who need support in accessing appropriate IT equipment may be eligible to apply for support from the University's hardship fund .
How the programme will be assessed <i>(a general summary of changes to assessment methods)</i>	In the context of COVID-19, modules that were previously assessed by on-campus examinations will be assessed in alternative ways, as we cannot guarantee a safe examination environment in the coming academic year. Where the exam was previously in the form of essay-style answers, it will be replaced by a coursework assignment. MCQ exams that previously took place at the end of modules will now be assessed by quizzes hosted on the KLE at regular intervals through the module. With the exception of examinations, the types of assessment that you can expect through your degree remain consistent. In some

	cases, where group projects were assessed, we may now assess you individually, although some group working will still be incorporated in learning activities.
How students are supported (<i>any alternative arrangements such as communication methods, support networks etc.</i>)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A firm commitment to delivering an outstanding student experience and excellent student outcomes via Keele's Flexible Digital Education model combining online and socially distanced small group teaching in-person (e.g., labs, workshops and seminars). • A firm commitment to on-campus research-led teaching across both Semesters, including utilising the School of Psychology's dedicated laboratory and computing spaces where appropriate. • Recognition of the value and importance of interaction between students and between students and staff as crucial elements of learning at university; such interactions will remain at the heart of our teaching. • A research-led approach to teaching, building on the School's research expertise in the areas of cognitive, brain and behaviour research, developmental psychology, health and wellbeing, and social psychological research. • Final year students will be supported to develop a research project that can be managed even if social distancing is imposed, and will work through regular meetings with their supervisor to conduct engaging research of excellent quality. • Regular, live "Q&A style" sessions with academic staff and fellow students to support online learning on each module, to enhance student engagement, and to develop cohort identity. • Dedicated one-to-one academic support and pastoral guidance, through regular meetings with personal tutors and engagement with visible and accessible academic staff.
