What is the most important/striking thing that you took away from the experience?

- *How hard it is to be a good listener, even if you know in theory what to do. It's the practice that matters, and also the supporting conditions (right mood, right time, right place, feeling safe, etc)*
- *The importance of generating an active interest in what the other person is saying.*
- *That background has a strong influence on our approach and understanding of sustainability*
- *To not anticipate a response or form your answer before the other person has finished their point*


In what ways has taking part in the workshop affected your day-to-day communication?

How do we create the right environment?

Explanatory Note:

After workshop 1 we banished PowerPoint!

Teaching/learning face-to-face communications is much more successful when the focus remains on people and dialogue, NOT technology and NOT broadcast.

Demonstrating the principles of open dialogue is also important – equality and inclusivity, a sense of a safe environment, hence our preference for everyone to be seated in a circle, and facilitation not to be too prescriptive.





A circle, no barriers



Movement, use of floor as an equaliser



Spaces to get into pairs uninterrupted



Space to move chairs in different configurations

Some tips...

- Need to 'warm people up' before 1-1 communication – group conversations to share different perspectives with everyone
- Need to 'role model' communication. You can't teach 1-1 communication through 1-way transmission!
- Seated in a circle, 'presenting' while sitting (no PPT!)
- Knowing we are all 'bad' at listening helps relax people
- Encourage people to discuss communication in their own discipline
- Emphasising principles of equality and openness
- Emphasising the role of curiosity in conversation

OPEN DIALOGUE ACTIVITY: summary

Conditions that support 'meaningful' conversation

1. Respect – genuinely listening and considering your responses
2. Openness - no personal agenda, honest responses
3. Equality – non-judgmental, tolerant
4. Empathy – put yourself in the other persons shoes

and
Cognitive Effort – giving the speaker your full attention




Active Listening: Barriers to listening

What stops us listening?

There many distractions, internal and external that make it difficult for us to stay focused on listening, physical noise is just one example.

- What often distracts you from really listening?
- Have a conversation (pairs or group) about what you think the main distractions are ('noise') that cause us to lose focus and stop listening.






